INTRODUCTION

The Warren County Combined Health District is devoted to the Prevention of disease and injury, the Promotion of wellness and healthy living, and the Protection of the public from communicable disease and health threats.

The Warren County Combined Health District touches the lives of every Warren County resident by:

- Inspecting restaurants and groceries to assure food is safe and to educate operators on food safety.
- Protecting the community from the spread of infectious and communicable diseases.
- Assuring safe private water wells and home sewage treatment systems.
- Providing immunizations for all ages to prevent illness.
- Inspecting public pools, schools, camps and manufactured home parks.
- Making home visits to address concerns about family health and public health nuisances.
- Providing certified birth and death certificates.

In December 2009, the state updated the birth certificate program so it now allows us to issue birth certificates for anyone born in Ohio, no matter where the birth occurred. This enhanced service makes it more convenient for Warren County residents to obtain a certified copy of their birth certificate by coming to our Lebanon office.

We have an improved website www.wcchd.com to make it easier for the public to get up to date information regarding the health department. Our goal is to make it user friendly and to give you access to the information you want and need. Please visit our site and let us know what you think and how we can improve it.

CLINICAL SERVICES

The Warren County Combined Health District's clinical services continue to change and expand along with the growing changes in our community. The unemployment rate of Warren County definitely impacts the number of clients we are seeing yearly.

The **Prenatal Clinic** offers total obstetrical care for clients at the Lebanon office with delivery at Bethesda North Hospital of TriHealth. The staff consists of OB/GYN physicians (from Bethesda North), R.N.s., a licensed dietician, case worker, and a secretary. Early and consistent prenatal care is encouraged to help ensure the health and well being of both mother and child. All clients who start prenatal care early and keep all their appointments receive a free car seat (with car seat education). In addition, the prenatal staff has placed greater emphasis on counseling and referral of clients with specific social problems and on counseling clients on daily health, nutrition, and smoking patterns. Caseworkers assist clients in applying for Medicaid when applicable.

The **Child Health Clinic** in both the Lebanon and Franklin offices provides comprehensive routine exams and acute care for children from birth to 21 years of age. These exams include screenings and lab work if necessary. The staff consists of a physician, R.N.s, a secretary, case worker, and licensed dietician. Because early identification of problems can decrease the likelihood of life long disabilities, referrals to other agencies, such as Help Me Grow, etc., are made if necessary. Also, caseworkers assist clients in applying for Medicaid, when applicable.

The **Adult Care Clinic** in both the Lebanon and Franklin offices provides basic physician services for clients from 21 years of age to 65 years of age who reside in Warren County. This clinic was developed to provide health care and referral services to uninsured clients or clients with Medicaid. The staff consists of a physician, R.N.s, a secretary, case worker, and a licensed dietician. The case worker helps clients apply for free medications through the patient assistance program of the pharmaceutical companies.

The **Sexually Transmitted Infection Clinic** at the Lebanon office is offered to both men and women. All STI testing and treatment is confidential and is free of charge. The Health Department also offers HIV/AIDS testing and education through this clinic.

The Reproductive Health Clinic at the Lebanon office provides reliable methods of contraception to enable women to plan their pregnancies. This clinic provides pregnancy testing and complete gynecologic physical exams for clients desiring contraception. The staff consists of a physician, registered nurses, secretary, case worker and a licensed dietician. The clinic coordinator has implemented preconception education and counseling programs for prepubescent and pubescent children for many schools and other public organizations. This clinic is a provider for the Ohio Department of Health Breast and Cervical Cancer Screening Project in our Lebanon office. This year, the Reproductive Health Clinic began seeing males. Caseworkers assist clients in applying for Medicaid, when applicable.

The main goal of the **TB Chest Clinic** is to eradicate tuberculosis in Warren County through early diagnosis and treatment. Mantoux skin testing and chest x-rays, when required, are available at a minimal charge to Warren County residents. Treatment for tuberculosis and preventive therapy (INH) are also offered by the Warren County Combined Health District at the Lebanon office

The **Overseas Travel Clinic** provides immunizations and education necessary to travel safely to/from other countries. This service is provided in the Lebanon office.

The **Prevent Blindness Clinic** in the Lebanon office provides free vision exams, at local Optometrists, for low income residents. The exams are provided through State funding.

In addition, the Warren County Combined Health District offers **nutritional counseling**, **social services and blood pressure checks** to all clinic clients and residents of Warren County. **Free weight management classes** are held every Monday, 4:00-6:00 pm, in the Lebanon office.

The health department also provides Spanish interpretation services for clients, if necessary.

HOME HEALTH NURSING/AIDE CARE

Warren County Combined Health District's home health staff is dedicated to serving homebound clients in Warren County. This staff consists of a home health aide (HHA) and an R.N. that makes HHA supervisory visits to the client's home. The purpose of this care is to enable the patient to remain in the home while enjoying the highest possible level of health.

The home health aide component of the Home Health Program continues to provide personal care assistance for the homebound client. This service is beneficial to the residents because it allows the client to remain in their own home and maintain independent living versus moving from their home and staying in dependent living quarters.

Home bound residents are also provided yearly seasonal flu vaccinations in their home by health department nurses.

IMMUNIZATION PROGRAM

The immunization program continues to be a major focus of the Warren County Combined Health District. Timely immunization of our children leads to the decline of communicable illnesses such as measles, mumps, rubella, diphtheria, polio, tetanus, pertussis, haemophilus influenza, hepatitis B, hepatitis A, meningitis, rotavirus, etc. Every year the health department experiences many changes that occur within the immunization schedules. New immunizations and new combinations of immunizations are added, while other immunizations are deleted. To meet the immunization needs of the county, we offer a weekly walk-in childhood immunization clinic on Tuesday's 8:00-11:00 a.m. in the Lebanon office, as well as daily appointments.

Influenza (flu) vaccine is offered yearly by the Warren County Combined Health District to the general population. This year, the flu vaccine included the seasonal flu and H1N1 flu strains and the health department began giving the flu vaccinations in September. The health department conducted several mass seasonal flu inoculation clinics for Warren County residents to enable us to continue to test our capabilities in the event of an actual pandemic that would necessitate mass immunizations.

The Out-of-Country-Traveling Immunization Program was added in 1999. This program has grown tremendously and continues to provide immunizations to Warren County residents who are traveling out of the United States. This service is also available to people who are not residents of Warren County, at an added cost.

Warren County Combined Health District also offers public health vaccines such as Hepatitis A/B, Pre-Exposure Rabies, Pneumococcal, Meningococcal and Varicella vaccinations.

HEALTH EDUCATION

Health education activities are an essential part of the health department's mission to improve the health of the residents of Warren County. The health educator has continued to support the work done by our nursing and environmental health staff.

In 2011, the health educator continued to coordinate and support the efforts of the Warren County Unit of the Medical Reserve Corps, collaborated with local preschools to provide dental health and hand washing presentations as well as assisted individuals in finding affordable dental and healthcare services. The health educator also provided educational information at health/safety fairs, created various educational brochures, media releases, and flyers for the health department, published the Warren County Combined Health District's monthly newsletter, provided training for health department staff and delivered health education presentations to community groups and schools. The health educator also continued to provide support to the bioterrorism program.

ENVIRONMENTAL HEALTH

The Environmental Health Division works to protect the environment, prevent disease, and protect the health of the community through the enforcement of local and state rules and regulations along with providing consultations regarding environmental health programs and activities. Our public health environmentalists conduct routine inspections of licensed establishments, investigate public health nuisance complaints, and provide education on environmental issues affecting Warren County. The listed inspections and consultations illustrate the many activities by the staff in 2011. Also, this past year included revisions to the Private Water System Rules and Regulations, the Public Swimming Pool and Spa Rules and Regulations, both effective April 1, along with an increase in the number of bed bug complaints investigated by our agency.

Private water systems include water wells, ponds, springs, cisterns and hauled water storage tanks that provide drinking water to fewer than 25 people, less than sixty days out of the year, and have less than 15 service connections. These include single water supplies that serve homes, small businesses, small churches, small mobile home parks, or communities with fewer than 25 residents. The revisions of the rules included water system construction changes, inspection requirements, and water sampling collection procedures and analysis.

The most significant change in the swimming pool rules and regulations was the requirement to license and inspect spray grounds which are special use pools in conjunction with fountains, sprays, jets and other devices not utilizing standing water. Our staff currently inspects all licensed public pools and spas at least once a month unless problems are noted with the facility. The prevention of waterborne diseases and health hazards are the main goals of the inspection program. Education of pool and spa operators also is emphasized during inspections, particularly if there are problems with water quality or safety concerns noted during the inspection.

In 2011, bed bugs were a large part of the public health nuisances received by the environmental health staff. The number of complaints and infestations continued to significantly increase as awareness of this problem increased. The staff inspected all complaints received and provided guidance to property owners and individuals regarding the proper control of bed bugs. Lastly, several changes in leadership for the environmental health staff occurred in 2011. Robert Caughron, R.S. was promoted to Program Coordinator for the sewage system, private water, and swimming pool programs. Also, Dennis G. Murray, R.S., M.P.H. joined the division, in October, as the Environmental Health Director.

PLUMBING INSPECTION SERVICE

The Plumbing Inspection Department of the Warren County Combined Health District is responsible for ensuring proper installation of plumbing throughout all of Warren County in accordance with Chapter 4101:2-56-69 of the Ohio Administrative Code, also known as the Ohio Plumbing Code, and local regulations. The inspectors conduct inspections for bathroom and kitchen remodeling (when fixtures are added or moved) water heater replacement, water softeners, new single and multi-family residential, and all commercial plumbing installations. They also review plumbing plans for compliance with the Ohio Plumbing Code and if approved, issue permits. This department also performs inspections of water line installations from the meter pit into the house or building within the City of Mason.

In 2011, 316 plumbing contractors registered with the Warren County Health Department along with 196 installers to do plumbing work. Also during 2011, over 1800 permits were issued, 4438 inspections were made. 2890 consultations took place to assist contractors and homeowners.

The Plumbing Inspection Division also administers a water backflow prevention program, which involves making sure building owners have their required backflow prevention device tested annually (as required by the Ohio Plumbing Code) to assure it is working properly to protect the public's drinking water.

VITAL STATISTICS 2011

801 deaths and 12 births were reported and filed as having occurred in Warren County in 2011 (compared to 734 deaths and 11 births in 2010). Births and deaths are recorded in the county in which they occur, regardless of residence. 3,775 certified copies of death certificates, and 1462 certified copies of birth certificates were issued, along with 248 burial permits, and 50 affidavits for birth and death certificates. Also, 6 certificates of service and 56 supplementaries were recorded.

WIC PROGRAM

The Special Supplemental Food Program for Women, Infants and Children (WIC) was established by Congress as a pilot program in 1972 and authorized as a national program in 1975. WIC is going into its 38th year of service. It is a cost-effective, federally funded, preventive, nutrition education program that also provides nutritious foods, breastfeeding guidance and access to health care. The WIC Program is not an entitlement program, but an income eligible program.

During 2011, the Warren County WIC Program maintained an average of 1,653 clients per month. Warren County has been on the retail system for fourteen years now with 20 vendors. The quarterly redemption rate for Warren County is \$413,699.00 in coupon sales. Local WIC projects continue to issue the new foods and the new fruit and vegetable vouchers that began in October 2009. The food coupons continue to be given for milk, juice, cereal, peanut butter, dried beans, whole grains, fruits, vegetables, infant formula, infant cereal and baby food fruits and vegetables. The program also continues to offer breastfeeding support through their Breastfeeding Peer Helper Program which started in October 2010.

The WIC Program has a proven track record and has demonstrated a consistent pattern of positive health/nutrition benefits.
