CLINICAL SERVICES

The Warren County Combined Health District's clinical services continue to change and expand along with the growing changes in our community. The **Prenatal Clinic** offers total obstetrical care for clients with delivery at Bethesda North Hospital of TriHealth. The staff consists of OB/GYN physicians (from Bethesda North), registered nurses, a licensed dietician, case worker, and a secretary. Early and consistent prenatal care is encouraged to help ensure the health and wellbeing of both mother and child. Clients who start prenatal care early and keep all their appointments receive a free car seat (with car seat education) if needed. In addition, the prenatal staff has placed greater emphasis on counseling and referral of clients with specific social problems, and on counseling clients on daily health, nutrition, and smoking patterns. Caseworkers assist clients in applying for Medicaid when eligible.

The **Child Health Clinic** provides comprehensive routine exams, school and work physicals and acute care for children from birth to 21 years of age. These exams include screenings and lab work, if necessary. The staff consists of a physician, R.N.s, a secretary, case worker, and licensed dietician. Because early identification of problems can decrease the likelihood of life long disabilities, referrals to other agencies, such as Help Mc Grow, BCMH, etc., are made, if necessary. Also, caseworkers assist clients in applying for Medicaid, when eligible.

The Adult Care Clinic provides basic physician services and work physicals for clients from 21 years of age to 65 years of age who reside in Warren County. This clinic was developed to provide health care and referral services to uninsured clients or clients with Medicaid. The staff consists of a physician, R.N.s, a secretary, case worker, and a licensed dietician. The case worker helps clients apply for free medications through the patient assistance program of the pharmaceutical companies.

The **Sexually Transmitted Infection Clinic** services are offered to both men and women. All STI testing and treatment is confidential and is free of charge. This may change next year due to increasing laboratory fees. The Health Department also offers **HIV/AIDS** testing and education through this clinic.

The **Prevent Blindness Clinic** provides free vision exams at local Optometrists for low income residents. The exams are provided through State funding.

The **Reproductive Health Clinic** provides complete gynecologic physical exams for both clients desiring contraception and women's health needs. This clinic provides reliable methods of contraception to enable women to plan their pregnancies and also provides pregnancy testing. Reproductive Health services are also provided to males in this clinic. The staff consists of a physician, RN's, secretary, case worker and a licensed dietician. The clinic coordinator has implemented preconception education and counseling programs for prepubescent and pubescent children for many schools and other public organizations. This clinic is a provider for the Ohio Department of Health Breast and Cervical Cancer Screening Project (BCCP). Caseworkers assist clients in applying for Medicaid, when eligible.

The main goal of the **TB Chest Clinic** is to eradicate tuberculosis in Warren County through early diagnosis and treatment. Mantoux skin testing and chest x-rays, when required, are available at a minimal charge to Warren County residents. Treatment for tuberculosis and preventive therapy (INH) are also offered by the Warren County Combined Health District. In the event of an active case of TB in Warren County, WCCHD staff provide Direct Observed Therapy (DOT).

The Overseas Travel Clinic provides immunizations and education necessary to travel safely to/from other countries,

The **BCMH** (Bureau for Children's Medical Handicaps) program of WCCHD provides case management and service coordination for Warren County families with children under the age of 21 years who have or potentially have special health care needs. The health department has one BCMH nurse.

In addition, the Warren County Combined Health District offers **nutritional counseling**, social services, and blood pressure checks to all clinic clients and residents of Warren County. Free weight management classes for all ages are held every Monday, 4:00-6:00 pm.

The health department also provides Spanish interpretation services for clients, if necessary.

As required by law physicians, hospitals, labs and healthcare providers must report certain communicable diseases to the health district. Communicable disease reports received by the Warren County Combined Health District are investigated and documented according to state guidelines. All reports received are kept confidential according to HIPAA requirements.

HOME HEALTH NURSING/AIDE CARE

The Warren County Combined Health District's home health staff is dedicated to serving homebound clients in Warren County. This staff consists of a home health aide (HHA) and an R.N. that makes HHA supervisory visits to the client's home. The purpose of this care is to enable the patient to remain in the home while enjoying the highest possible level of health.

The home health aide component of the Home Health Program continues to provide personal care assistance for the homebound client. This service is beneficial to the residents because it allows the client to remain in their own home and maintain independent living versus moving from their home and staying in dependent living quarters.

Home bound residents are also provided yearly seasonal flu vaccinations in their home by health department nurses.

IMMUNIZATION PROGRAM

The immunization program continues to be an important focus of the Warren County Combined Health District. Timely immunization of our children can help lead to the decline of communicable illnesses such as measles, mumps, rubella, diphtheria, polio, tetanus, pertussis, haemophilus influenza, hepatitis B, hepatitis A, meningitis, rotavirus, etc. Every year the health department experiences many changes that occur within the immunization schedules. New immunizations and new combinations of immunizations are added, while other immunizations are deleted. To meet the immunization needs of the county, we offer appointments for childhood immunizations throughout the week, Monday through Friday.

In addition to the many flu vaccination clinics provided at the Warren County Combined Health District, the nursing staff traveled to various Warren County businesses to provide flu vaccinations to as many residents as possible. This year, the health department began giving the flu vaccinations in September.

The Overseas Travel Immunization Program was added in 1999. This program has grown tremendously and continues to provide immunizations to Warren County residents who are traveling out of the United States. This service is also available to people who are not residents of Warren County, at an added cost.

Warren County Combined Health District also offers public health vaccines such as Hepatitis A/B, Pre-Exposure Rabies, Pneumococcal, Meningococcal and Varicella vaccinations.

WIC PROGRAM

WIC – The Special Supplemental Nutrition Program for Women, Infants and Children is intended to reach income-eligible pregnant, postpartum and breastfeeding women, infants and children up to five years of age with a health or nutrition risk. WIC services are set up to address WIC's most important goal: prevention of nutrition-related health problems. WIC provides: 1) Nutrition education and supplemental foods supplying key nutrients; 2) Health screenings and assessments; 3) Breastfeeding education and support; and 4) Referral to prenatal and pediatric health care and other maternal and child health care and human service programs. All of these services help to improve overall health during the most critical growth and developmental years in a child's life – conception to age five. By preventing health problems early in life, WIC helps save health care dollars later.

The WIC program celebrated its 41st birthday on January 15th, 2014. In 2014, the Warren County WIC Program maintained an average of 1,356 clients per month. Warren County has been on the retail system for sixteen years now with 20 vendors. The quarterly redemption rate for Warren County is \$435,971.29 in coupon sales. Local WIC projects continue to issue the new food packages that began in October 2009. The new food packages added fruits, vegetables, whole grains, lower fat milk for adults and children two years of age and older. The new food packages for infants, also added baby food fruits and vegetables. In the Spring/Summer of 2015, the current food coupon system will be replaced with a WIC Electronic Benefits Transfer (EBT) nutrition card. WIC participants will no longer receive food coupons. Instead, they will receive a WIC EBT nutrition card loaded with their food packages that will be able to be scanned at any Ohio WIC vendor. In addition our Breastfeeding Peer Helper Program initiated in October 2010 continues to offer breastfeeding support and grow steadily in numbers.

ENVIRONMENTAL HEALTH

The Environmental Health Division works to prevent disease, protect the health of the community, and protect the environment through the enforcement of local and state rules and regulations along with providing consultations regarding environmental health programs and activities. Our public health sanitarians conduct routine inspections of licensed establishments, investigate public health nuisance complaints, and provide education on environmental issues affecting Warren County. The enclosed inspections and consultations help illustrate the many activities conducted by the staff in 2014.

The year 2014 included the implementation of a new electronic environmental health inspection and licensing software EH DSI (also known as HealthSpace) that was provided to local health districts by the Ohio Department of Health. This program allows for the electronic documentation of environmental health inspection reports on the HealthSpace servers as well as immediate accessibility of inspection reports online at www.wcchd.com. Currently, HealthSpace modules have been developed for the food safety, public swimming pools/spas, and recreational campgrounds. The development of other modules such as private water systems and household sewage treatment systems is underway.

In the summer of 2014, the Warren County Combined Health District began the collection and testing of mosquitos from various locations in the county for the presence of West Nile Virus. Throughout the course of the summer the environmental health staff collected and submitted 3116 mosquitos from 76 locations around Warren County for testing at the Ohio Department of Health. Overall, there were two samples that were found to be positive for the presence of West Nile Virus within Warren County.

During the year 2014 the Ohio Department of Health finalized the Ohio Sewage Treatment System Rules. These replaced the existing Warren County Sewage Treatment System Regulations as of January 1, 2015. The updated rules included many changes such as a more uniform registration process for sewage treatment system installers, septage haulers, and service providers. The Warren County Combined Health District hosted an educational day presented by the Ohio Department of Health for area sanitarians and sewage treatment system contractors on November 17th to educate interested parties about the changes the new rules contained. Additionally, individuals and businesses that wish to perform work on sewage treatment systems under the new rules are required to pass a competency test regarding the Ohio Sewage Treatment System Rules. The Warren County Combined Health District hosted two testing days in November on the 19th and the 24th.

Throughout the course of 2014 several sections of the health district's website within Environmental Health were updated. These areas included: sewage disposal, private water systems, campgrounds, and manufactured home parks.

PLUMBING INSPECTION SERVICE

The Plumbing Inspection Department of the Warren County Combined Health District is responsible for ensuring proper installation of plumbing throughout all of Warren County in accordance with Chapter 4101:2-56-69 of the Ohio Administrative Code, also known as the Ohio Plumbing Code, and local regulations. The inspectors conduct inspections for bathroom and kitchen remodeling (when fixtures are added or moved), water heater replacement, water softeners, new single and multi-family residential, and all commercial plumbing installations. They also review plumbing plans for compliance with the Ohio Plumbing Code, and if approved, issue permits. This department also performs inspections of water line installations from the meter pit into the house or building within the City of Mason.

In 2014, 347 plumbing contractors registered with WCCHD along with 250 installers to do plumbing work in the county. Also during 2014, over 2200 permits were issued and 5252 inspections were conducted. Over 3100 consultations took place to assist contractors and homeowners with plumbing code issues.

The Plumbing Division also administers a water backflow prevention program. This involves making sure building owners have their required backflow prevention device tested annually (as required by the Ohio Plumbing Code) to assure it is working properly to protect the public's drinking water.

EMERGENCY PREPAREDNESS AND RESPONSE

One of the primary roles of the Warren County Combined Health District is to prepare for and respond to public health emergencies. We are continually preparing and modifying our emergency response plans in an effort to be capable of addressing the needs of the growing population in Warren County and to respond to emerging public health threats. Local and regional exercises test the capabilities of the emergency response plans. Training programs improve the emergency response abilities of the public health workforce. The Warren County Combined Health District strives to have a plan that can respond to all public health emergencies from Pandemic Flu to bioterrorism to power outages.

In 2014, the health department made great strides in improving existing plans and strengthening relationships with our local and regional partners. Warren County participated in a full-scale exercise named Operation Mutual Aid in April 2014 as part of the Southwest Ohio Public Health Region. The exercise simulated a widespread release of anthrax in the region. The exercise tested the ability of local public health to provide life-saving medications during a public health emergency.

The need to prepare for emerging infectious disease outbreaks was realized when an individual with Ebola came to Ohio. Across the state, public health professionals began to plan for the reality of Ebola, or another highly infectious disease, coming to their jurisdictions. Preparation efforts in the coming years will encompass protecting the health and safety of public health workers and other first responders.

As required by the Cities Readiness Initiative grant, the Ohio Department of Health conducted a Technical Assistance Review of the Warren County Combined Health District in January of 2014, which measured the capacity of our jurisdiction to receive and distribute Strategic National Stockpile medical assets in the event of a public health emergency. The Warren County Combined Health District received a score of 98, which was an 8-point increase from the previous assessment score from 2013.

HEALTH EDUCATION

In 2014, the health educator continued to work with the WCCHD nursing and environmental staff, Ohio Department of Health, community agencies, regional groups, schools and county residents to promote and improve the health, safety and wellness of citizens in Warren County. The health educator collaborated with community coalitions such as the Warren County Safe Communities coalition. This coalition participated in several campaigns throughout the year with a focus on seatbelt safety, driving sober and not texting and driving.

The health educator participated in several health fairs which provided health education and awareness information to the community as well as worked daily as a referral source to connect community members to needed health and social service resources. Health education was also integrated into the WCCHD health clinics as education was offered to clients on various health and safety related topics.

In addition to the above listed activities, the health educator served as the Public Information Officer for the health district preparing media releases, updating and promoting social media sites, as well as continuing to meet the deliverables of the Public Health Emergency Preparedness grant. During 2014, WCCHD also partnered with several community agencies and the group was awarded a Tobacco Free Environments grant. The health educator is working together with these agencies to plan initiatives related to increasing tobacco free environments in Warren County.

VITAL STATISTICS 2014

915 deaths and 13 births were reported and filed as having occurred in Warren County in 2014 (compared to 902 deaths and 11 births in 2013). Births and deaths are recorded in the county in which they occur, regardless of residence. 4,391 certified copies of death certificates, 2,149 certified copies of birth certificates, along with 320 burial permits, 17 affidavits for birth, and 21 affidavits for death were issued. Also, 7 certificates of service and 64 supplementaries were recorded.
